
The first day to be called Anzac Day was 13 October 1915 and occurred in Adelaide as a replacement for the Eight-Hour Day holiday (a forerunner of Labour Day and already a public holiday). This event was more of a patriotic carnival designed to raise awareness of, and funds for, the war effort than the solemn commemoration it was to become.

Anzac Day as we know it was first observed on 25 April 1916, as people came together to honour those lost at Gallipoli. In Australia, some state governments organised events to commemorate the occasion—but the Commonwealth, other than naming the day as Anzac Day, did not.

By the late 1920s, Anzac Day was a public holiday in every state and territory. In the 1930s, there was rhetoric about the need to pass the 'Anzac spirit' down to the next generation. This was partly politically motivated, as there was a feeling that people needed steeling for another war. In the Second World War, the 'sons of the Anzacs' were welcomed, and the day now honoured veterans of all wars. But despite greater numbers of veterans, by the 1960s its popularity had waned, and many wondered if Anzac Day would survive.

The resurgence started in the 1980s and 1990s. The RSL had been slow to welcome 'others'—notably those who did not serve overseas, including most ex-servicewomen, and veterans of the 'small' wars. With a younger leadership, it has relaxed the rules to be more inclusive. Governments have reinforced the day's significance with commemorative programs that reach out to the community.



The news of long-time member Les Heaps' passing was received with sadness last week. Les passed away at Uniting Aged care home "Kamilaroi" in Lane Cove on Monday 11th April. He became a centenarian on November 6th 2021.

Les joined the Club (then known as Lane Cove West Bowling Club) in June 1977 after the closing of the Lane Cove Bowling Club (corner Kenneth Street and River Road, Longueville).

Les was a self-reliant and industrious man living at home (with a large workshop) until health issues forced him to go to aged care some four years ago. Up until this time he was an active bowler.

His practicality and work ethic saw him heavily involved in maintenance work for the Club and he was always up for the job sometimes at his own peril given his age.

Les received sectional citizenship awards for his contribution to local sporting bodies and a Club Merit Award in 2013.

AUSSIE DESTINATIONS – Comboyne, NSW

Small town the hinterland behind Port Macquarie which promotes itself as having "peace, quiet and fresh mountain air".



Comboyne is a small rural village which lies west of Port Macquarie. Historically a timber and dairy town, today it is known for its cut flower farms, its avocados, kiwifruit, blueberries, macadamias and potatoes. As dairy farming has declined many local farmers have moved across to beef cattle. It is a pleasant, sleepy destination on the Comboyne Plateau, an area of 180 square kilometres characterised by red basalt soils and high rainfall. The town is surrounded by particularly beautiful bushwalking country and a number of impressive waterfalls. Once covered by rainforest it has been cleared and there are now only pockets of rainforest.

Population: 454 (2016 census) Elevation: 705 m (2,313 ft)

Location

Comboyne is located 388 km north of Sydney via the Pacific Highway to Kendall and then Lorne Road. The village is 57 km south-west of Port Macquarie.

Origin of Name

It is believed that "cunboyne" was a Birpai Aboriginal word meaning "female kangaroo".

Comboyne Mural and Mosaic



Located in the heart of the village the Mural depicts the history of the Comboyne Plateau. It was created by local artist Tertius who has 30 years of experience creating murals in the local area. The Mosaic has the theme of the water ecology of the plateau. It was created with assistance from Guy Crossley who initiated the project. Local school children were involved in

the making of hand made ceramic tiles which were assembled under the guidance of artists Skye and Tertius - the mosaic platypus was created by local artist Kate Robinson.

Ellenborough Falls



Ellenborough Falls is located 28 km from Comboyne on Colling Road via Elands. From Elands, head north along Glenwarrin Rd for 3 km and turn to the right on Ellenborough Falls Road. The falls drop 160 m into the valley of the Ellenborough River. This makes them one of the longest single-drop falls in the Southern Hemisphere.

Boorganna Nature Reserve

This small, 396 ha reserve is the second-oldest nature reserve in the state. It is a rare opportunity to see what the plateau was like before the cedar cutters and dairy farmers cleared the forests. It is located by heading west out of town on the Wingham Road, turning onto Innes View Road and following the signs to Boorganna Nature Reserve and Rawson Falls. There is a 2.7 km walking track that leads through remnant rainforest to a lookout at the 40 m high Rawson Falls. The reserve possesses sub-tropical and eucalypt forest, diverse birdlife and fauna and there are excellent picnic areas. In spring it is noted for its flowering orange blossom and spotted cinnamon orchids.

Bridal Veil Falls Flora Reserve

Located at the corner of Comboyne and Stennetts Road this peaceful reserve provides excellent views across to the plateau to the north-west.

History

- * In 1834 the Surveyor General, Sir Thomas Mitchell, published a map of New South Wales which mentioned "Cunboyne" as a district to the west of Port Macquarie.
- * By the 1870s timber cutters were reaping a rich harvest from the cedar in the rainforest.
- * The area was opened up for settlement with land being selected on the Comboyne Plateau in the late 1880s.
- * In 1899 Thomas Jones, who became known as the "Father of Comboyne" selected land on the Comboyne Plateau.
- * In 1902 the site for the village of Comboyne was officially proclaimed.
- * In the first decade of the twentieth century 100 settlers took up land on the plateau. The land was cleared and dairy farming became the dominant local industry.
- * By 1910 the cedar in the district had been exhausted.
- * In 1914 a local butter factory was opened.
- * By 1920 the village had a bakery, butchers' shops, general stores, blacksmith, police station, post office, butter factory, boarding house, tinsmith and two banks.
- * In 1921 the village had a population of 777.
- * Electricity reached the town in 1950.





The unforgettable novel of a childhood in a sleepy Southern town and the crisis of conscience that rocked it. "To Kill A Mockingbird" became both an instant bestseller and a critical success when it was first published in 1960. It went on to win the Pulitzer Prize in 1961 and was later made into an Academy Awardwinning film, also a classic.

Compassionate, dramatic, and deeply moving, "To Kill A Mockingbird" takes readers to the roots of human behaviour - to innocence and experience, kindness and cruelty, love and hatred, humour and pathos. Now with over 18 million copies in print and translated into forty languages, this regional story by a young Alabama woman claims universal appeal. Harper Lee always considered her book to be a simple love story. Today it is regarded as a masterpiece of American literature.

Earth's Population Statistics in Perspective

The World population is projected at 7,874,965,825 or 7,875 million or 7.87 billion as of July 1, 2021. The Global population is estimated at 7,794,798,739 or 7,795 million or 7.79 billion for the year 2020. In 2023, the human population will grow to more than 8 billion.

Globally, the share of the population aged 65 years or over increased from 6 per cent in 1990 to 9 per cent in 2019. That proportion is projected to rise further to 16 per cent by 2050, so that one in six people in the world will be aged 65 years or over.

For most people, it is a large figure However, if you condensed 7.9 billion into 100 persons, and then into various percentage statistics the resulting analysis is relatively much easier to comprehend.

Out of 100:

11 are in Europe; 5 are in North America; 9 are in South America; 15 are in Africa and 60 are in Asia

49 live in the countryside and 51 live in cities

75 have mobile phones and 25 do not.

30 have internet access and 70 do not have the availability to go online

7 received university education and 93 did not attend college.

83 can read and 17 are illiterate.

33 are Christians; 22 are Muslims; 14 are Hindus; 7 are Buddhists; 12 are other religions and 12 have no religious beliefs.

25 live less than 14 years; 66 died between 15 - 64 years of age and 9 are over 65 years old.

If you have your own home, eat full meals & drink clean water, have a mobile phone, can surf the internet, and have gone to college, you are in the miniscule privileged lot (in the less than 7% category).

Amongst 100 persons in the world, only 9 live or exceed the age of 65!

If you are over 65 years old, be content & grateful. Cherish life, grasp the moment.

If you did not leave this world before the age of 64 like the 91 persons who have gone before you, you are already the blessed amongst mankind.

Take good care of your own health. Cherish every remaining moment.

If you think you are suffering memory loss......

Anosognosia, very interesting...

In the following analysis the French Professor Bruno Dubois, Director of the Institute of Memory and Alzheimer's Disease (IMMA) at La Pitié-Salpêtrière - Paris Hospitals, addresses the subject in a rather reassuring way:

"If anyone is aware of their memory problems, they do not have Alzheimer's."

- 1. forget the names of families.
- 2. do not remember where I put some things.

It often happens in people 60 years and older that they complain that they lack memory. "The information is always in the brain, it is the "processor" that is lacking."

This is "Anosognosia" or temporary forgetfulness.

Half of people 60 and older have some symptoms that are due to age rather than disease. The most common cases are:

- forgetting the name of a person,
- going to a room in the house and not remembering why we were going there,
- a blank memory for a movie title or actor, an actress,
- a waste of time searching where we left our glasses or keys.

After 60 years most people have such a difficulty, which indicates that it is not a disease but rather a characteristic due to the passage of years.

Many people are concerned about these oversights hence the importance of the following statements:

- 1."Those who are conscious of being forgetful have no serious problem of memory."
- 2. "Those who suffer from a memory illness or Alzheimer's, are not aware of what is happening."

Professor Bruno Dubois, Director of IMMA, reassures the majority of people concerned about their oversights:

"The more we complain about memory loss, the less likely we are to suffer from memory sickness."

WHO IS BRUNO DUBOIS?



Bruno Dubois is currently Professor of Neurology at the Neurological Institute of the Salpétrière University Hospital at Paris, University Pierre et Marie Curie Paris 6. He is Director of the Behavioural Neurology Department and of the Dementia Research Centre at the Hospital. He is also Director of the Research Unit Inserm U-610 of the ICM (Institut du Cerveau et de la Moelle Epinière) of the Hospital. He is coordinator of the National Reference Centre on Rare Dementias" and of the National Reference Centre for young-onset Alzheimer patients. He is President of the Scientific Committee of France-Alzheimer and of IFRAD (International Fund Raising for Alzheimers disease), consultant for the Human Frontier Program and Expert of the French Agency of

Drugs. He is a member of the European Alzheimer Disease Consortium (EADC). He has published on anatomical and biochemical studies on the central cholinergic systems in rodents and humans; on cognitive neuropharmacology; and on neuropsychology in patients with dementia, with special reference to memory and executive functions. He recently organized an Expert Consensus on the new criteria for Alzheimers disease and a Task Force on the new criteria for Parkinsons disease dementia. He is principal or co-investigator of a number of research programs focusing on AD, prodromal AD and dementia in Parkinsons disease.

Some of the World's Craziest Easter Traditions:

A tradition of sending relatives and friends in Denmark, paper cuttings which often look like snowdrop/s is called gækkebrev. There is a rhyme hidden in each letter and the sender's name is replaced with dots. If the recipient can guess who sent the letter, the sender owes them a chocolate egg.

A popular tradition on Easter Monday in Hungary, when boys are visiting girls to tell a poem and sprinkle them with water or spray them with perfume to keep them young and fresh. As a reward they receive a neatly painted egg and they are served with a lot of different cakes, too. This tradition goes back to the ancient beliefs of fertility symbolised by the egg and the cleaning, healing effect of fresh water.

It is not all about hot cross buns and chocolate eggs in basket delivered by the easter bunny. An older game in the north of England is to roll eggs against one another or down hill. Hard boiled eggs are rolled down slopes to see whose egg goes furthest. If eggs are banged against each other the owner of the egg that stays in one piece without any cracks the longest is the winner.

Easter is known around the world for multi-coloured, decorated eggs. But in Greece you will find only red eggs. Red is the colour of life, you see, as well as a representation of the blood of Christ. From ancient times, the egg has been a symbol of the renewal of life, and the message of the red eggs is victory over death. Got it?

Easter time is crime time in Norway. Television channels run crime shows and a slew of new detective novels are commissioned to come out just before Easter. People across the country escape into their mountain cabins and spend the weekend with the 'whodunnit' television shows or books. Even the milk cartons carry short detective stories on their side during the season. The phenomenon was triggered by the immense popularity of a crime novel in 1923, set on the Bergen railway.

While the rest of the world hunts for Easter eggs hidden around the house, the good folk of Otago in New Zealand grab their guns for the annual 'Great Easter Bunny Hunt'. The idea is to rid farmlands of 'invasive pests', with over 500 hunters vying for the coveted trophy and the \$NZ 3,500 prize money. With over 10,000 rabbits meeting their maker each year, the Easter Bunny sensibly gives this corner of New Zealand a miss.


