Glenn and David conceded Carole and Stuart a 7-point start on handicap. Both teams were in dazzling form leading into this much awaited clash. The jaunty saunter of the players onto the green belied the premature ending to a great match due to an accidental fall by Carole.

Glenn and David bolted out of the gates and quickly reined in their handicap to lead 12-9 after 6 ends. Carole and Stuart knuckled down with some excellent bowls of their own to trail 13-14 at the half-way mark (11 ends) before Glenn and David added 2 for a lead of 16-13 after 12 ends.

End 13 was perhaps the turning point in the match and the finest end from both teams. Carole and Stuart held shot (maybe 2 shots!) in a tight head. David then produced the shot of the match to trail the jack for 4 shots! Stuart – unperturbed, with his last bowl, landed a smashing drive running through a tad too much but saving 2 shots in the process. Glenn and David 18: Carole and Stuart 13.

Glenn and David had slightly the better of the next 5 ends and led 22-15 after 18 ends when misfortune stuck. As Carole was corralling the bowls in preparation for the next end she unfortunately had a nasty fall cracking her head on the metal seating and injuring her wrist. Such was the pain of her injury she was unable to continue and both parties agreed to call it a day. At least for Carole half of the trophy found its way home!



All players had their special moments in the match. David had a particularly good game drawing exceptionally and playing well weighted shots to either trail the jack or wrest bowls. Glenn could always be relied upon for his consistency with his draw shots. Stuart has really honed his on shot skills and was always safe when a draw shot was required. Carole tried her heart out and tested Glenn on many occasions.

LANE COVE SQUAD SELECTED FOR PETER RUSSELL MEMORIAL TROPHY

Neutral Bay BC's 71st edition of the Peter Russell Memorial Trophy is a unique event as it is one of the few tournaments that is available for teams to compete, rather than individuals.

Entry fee of \$125 per team. Two bowls triples, a maximum of 5 players per team from each Club, any of whom may be interchanged at the completion of each game.

A maximum of 16 teams, graded between grades 4 and 7 inclusive, will compete and will be divided into 4 groups of four teams in each group. Each team will play three matches of ten ends per match, in a round robin format.

The qualifying rounds of the competition will be played in two sessions: Saturday 16 July 2022, commencing 9.00am, and Sunday 17 July 2022 commencing at 9.00am.

The winners in each group will return to play Semi Finals on Saturday 23 July 2022, commencing at 9.00am.

The draw for the Semi Finals will be as follows and played over 15 ends: The Winner of Group 1 plays the Winner of Group 2.

The Winner of Group 3 plays the Winner of Group 4.

There will be a 15 end Final between the Semi Final winners, and a 15-end playoff for 3rd and 4th placings (between the losing Semi Finalists).

Scoring will be as follows: 2 points for a win; 1 point for a tied game; in the event of a points draw, a countback system will apply, based on the difference between the total number of ends won and the total number of ends lost, during a session of play. The team with the largest difference will progress.

In the event of inclement weather, the Club may alter the conditions of play.

ELIGIBILITY FOR MAJOR AND MINOR SINGLES EVENTS

AUSSIE DESTINATIONS - Alstonville, NSW

Quiet town now part of NSW hinterland growth between Lismore and Ballina.



Alstonville is a pleasant hinterland town which lies between the larger centres of Lismore and Ballina. Surrounded by rolling hills where avocados and macadamia nuts are grown, it is primarily a service centre for the local population of around 5,000.

Location

Alstonville is located 733 km north of Sydney, 10 km west from the Pacific Highway and 19 km east of Lismore.

Origin of Name

An early settler, John Perry, named his house after his wife Annie Alston. The name became a byword for the area and it was a simple step to name the town Alstonville.

History

- * The district was settled by Europeans in the 1860s when cedar cutters moved into the area looking for timber.
- * By 1865 Andrew Freeborn and his brother Thomas had settled and were farming in the district which was known by the oxymoronic title of Duck Creek Mountain.
- * In 1873, John Perry, the local storeowner and postmaster, who had named his homestead and farm after his wife, Annie Alston, applied the name to the emerging township.
- * By the 1880s a town, known as Duck Creek, had grown to service the surrounding farmers. It had six stores and two pubs. The dominant industries were timber, dairy and sugar farming with four sawmills, nine sugar mills and, by 1900, there were four butter factories in the district.

Summerland House Farm



The House With No Steps was started by the quadriplegic Lionel Watts in 1956. It was created specifically as a place where physically and intellectually disabled people would acquire skills that would allow them to enter the workforce. The Summerland House With No Steps

project, which started in 1972, is one of the most successful of all the House With No Steps projects - there are now 160 of them on the east coast of Australia. It offers its disabled trainees a range of skills. Summerland House Farm currently employs over 90 people in the Alstonville area. Spread over 172 acres (70ha) it is now an avocado and macadamia farm with monthly local markets and a number of tourist attractions designed to appeal to the whole family including mini golf and a farm tractor tour. They have shops where produce can be purchased - and it really is excellent produce ranging from plants to fresh foodstuffs.

Crawford House Museum

The town's excellent museum with its displays of "objects, archaeological materials, photographs, oral histories and texts which tell the story of Alstonville and surrounding districts. Baby scales used by Nurse Thomas, a wedding dress now on the Powerhouse Dress Register and women's handicrafts featuring not only tatting but yatting form part of our significant collection." Originally



the home of William Ambrose Crawford, a fine example of an elegant Federation-era northern NSW timber house, it was built in 1911 and remained in the family until 1982. William's daughter lived in the town until 2018 when she died at the age of 99. It was sold to the Ballina Council in 1982, used as a baby health centre, and then in 2001 leased to the Alstonville Plateau Historical Society. It was officially opened as a museum in 2004.

Dalwood Falls



These falls are worth visiting for their peacefulness and their idyllic location in the rainforest. Although often referred to as dangerous, they are hugely popular with local youth who enjoy jumping from the sheer cliffs into the pool below the falls. The setting is attractive although difficult to locate because the falls are down a path in the bush and often the only sign of their location is a number of cars parked on the edges of Dalwood Road.

Victoria Park Nature Reserve



The Victoria Park Nature Reserve is a 17.5ha rainforest reserve with an 8ha remnant of subtropical rainforest. There is a pleasant boardwalk through the rainforest which is part of what was once known as the Big Scrub (some 75,000ha of untouched rainforest) which stretched from the coast inland. There are 68 different tree species in this small area including the 'Big Fig', a massive Moreton Bay fig. If you are lucky you might see redlegged pademelons, potoroos, water rats and possums.
